To participate in the DTU organised training listed below club members must have purchased the DTU training manual and assessment books and have them present during the training.

FWDSA DTU Training List

The following list shows the upcoming FWDSSA DTU organised training. As noted above you need to be a club member and have a DTU (Driver Training Unit) training manual and assessment book to participate.

This year (2014) the DTU will be providing training to clubs during the year. The DTU have already organised a remote first aid course, details of which have been sent to the clubs previously. This course was held on the 1st and 2nd February 2014.

1st - 2nd March Mud and Water Training

Two days of training and assessing of mud driving and water crossing.

This is being held at Black Cockatoo Bush Camp near Naracoorte, about 330km from Adelaide. Training will be provided to those that need it and assessing for those who believe that are already competent.

Cost is \$110 which covers trainer cost and property access. Trainers must pay their own camping fees. *Payment needs to be made by the 14th February*!

13th April Basic Practical

One days training and assessing at Callington. It will cover all available competencies, mud excluded.

Cost is \$20 plus property access

3rd - 4th May Basic Theory

Two day session covering the theory of basic 4WD driving and recovery at FWDSA rooms at Cavan.

Cost is \$20

17th - 18th May Basic Practical

Two days of training and assessing at Morgan. It will cover all available competencies. During this weekend we will also be running an advisor course. See details below.

Costs Training \$25

Advisor \$50

14th September OH&S, Risk and emergency response course

An internal course covering aspects of OH&S, risk management and emergency response relating to 4WD activities and training

Cost is \$20

To become a DTU Trainer or Assessor

To become a trainer and / or assessor, club members need to complete some of the modules from the Cert IV training certificate. These are:

- Trainer TAEDEL301 Provide work skill instruction
- Assessor TAEASS401 Plan assessment activities and processes
- TAEASS402 Assess competence
- TAEASS403 Participate in assessment validation

These can be done via TAFE or any other training organisation that can provide this training. It is up to the club member to find the most convenient training provider.

In addition, they need to attend an advisor course. During this course the DTU will assess whether their driving skills are sufficient to become a DTU trainer. When attending the course the trainee is expected to know the training and assessment logbook, i.e. the sequence of tasks of each assessment component.

The reason we recommend that this is done before attempting the Cert IV modules is that we do not want someone to spend significant effort in completing these to find out we do not find their driving skills to be sufficient. We do expect that our trainers and assessors have above average driving skills.

The next advisor course is at Morgan on 17th - 18th May. Cost is \$50.

Road Traffic Act Update - LED Light Bars

This is from the 19 Dec 2013 South Australian Government Gazette.

ROAD TRAFFIC ACT 1961

Pursuant to Section 163AA of the Road Traffic Act 1961

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE FITTING AND USE OF ADDITIONAL HEADLIGHTS INCLUDING LIGHT EMITTING DIODE LIGHT BARS ON MOTOR VEHICLES

1. EXEMPTION

In accordance with the powers delegated to me by the Minister for Transport, under Section 163AA of the *Road Traffic Act1961*, I hereby exempt motor vehicles with four or more wheels from the following provisions of the *Road Traffic (Vehicle Standards) Rules 1999*:

- Rule 80—How additional headlights are to be fitted.
- \cdot Rule 20—Compliance with third edition ADRs—but only insofar as it relates to Clause 7.3.2.1 of ADR 13/00.

2. CONDITIONS AND LIMITATIONS APPLYING TO THIS NOTICE

This exemption is subject to the conditions and limitations specified in this Notice. When operating under this Notice you must comply with the following conditions:

- 1. The lamps should, as far as is possible, be installed symmetrically in pairs to the front of the vehicle.
- 2. If lamps are not fitted as pairs (e.g. one), they must be fitted to the front of the vehicle, symmetrically at the centre.
- 3. The lamp/s must be installed in a way that the light produced does not cause the driver of the vehicle discomfort either directly or by reflection.
- 4. The lamp/s must only come on when the main-beam (high beam) headlamps are used, and must automatically turn off when the main-beam headlamps are turned off.

 - 7.2.1 Not less than 60 days notice in writing of the Annual General Meeting shall be given to every Member. FWDSA KIT 15 - Sand Flags in the Simpson Desert KEEPING IN TOUCH A PRODUCTION OF THE FWDSA EXECUTIVE

TO ALL MEMBERS OF FOUR WHEEL DRIVE SOUTH AUSTRALIA IMPORTANT AND COMPULSORY NEWS FROM DEWNR

A discussion at the Annual Meeting between FWDSA and DEWNR was the requirement for mandatory Simpson Desert vehicle flags.

This will commence with the opening of the Simpson Desert on March 16 2014.

The Director of National Parks and Wildlife John Schutz has already given approval in principle and this is the information going into the new Desert Parks Pass.

It is an initial requirement, and we will monitor how this works and decide if we need to alter it at all.

SAFETY FLAG REQUIREMENT

All vehicles must be fitted with a Safety flag as detailed below when travelling in the Simpson Desert Conservation Park, or Simpson Desert Regional Reserve.

Flag:

- Minimum 300mm wide by 290mm high.
- Made of Fluorescent materials, Red-Orange or Lime-Yellow in colour.

Motorbikes:

 Rear mounted flag pole, with top of the flag a minimum 3.5 metres from the ground.

All Other Vehicles:

- With Front Bullbar Flag pole attached to the bullbar, with top of the flag a minimum 3.5 metres from the ground.
- Without Front Bullbar Flag pole attached via bracket at the front of the vehicle, with top of the flag a minimum 3.5 metres from the ground;
- Alternatively, Flag pole attached to the front of the roof rack, with top of the flag a minimum 2 metres from the roof of vehicle.

RECOGNITION OF FWDSA VOLUNTEER WORK FOR DEWNR

At the Annual Dept of Environment Water and Natural Resources (DEWNR) - Four Wheel Drive SA (4WDSA) Forum last month DEWNR announced a significant concession . . . agreeing to extend its existing Friends of Parks Volunteer National Park Pass Benefit Scheme to now include active member volunteers of 4WDSA Affiliated Clubs who have completed 14 hours work on any project / working bee at any area covered by DEWNR (i.e. NRM areas as well as Parks & Reserves)

Note: This "work test" has been Backdated to include qualifying volunteer work carried out during 2013.

Entitlements through the scheme for such "active members" are:

- Multi Park Pass + Camping: Full Waiver (annual expiry 30 June) One Pass to be issued per volunteer and to be linked with one vehicle registration number
- •*Desert Parks Pass: 25% Discount (valid for 12 months from date of purchase)
- •*Additional Multi Park Pass + Camping: 50% Discount (valid for 12 months from date of purchase) for purchase and use by the same volunteer
 - * Pass holders will be registered in the DEWNR database and validation of registration is required to enable access to these benefits.

Clubs are asked to appoint a Committee Member / Member to coordinate and administer the scheme on behalf of their Club. Alan Pettigrew from the Mitsubishi 4WD Club SA has offered to take on the role of issuing the passes and will provide details to DEWNR etc.

Requests for the issue of passes should be forwarded "electronically" to Alan at aphome@adam.com.au by the coordinating Club representative and include: Full details of volunteer: Name, Address, Phone, Email

- Vehicle Registration
- Start Date

- •Scanned copies of relevant **OHS Volunteer Management Framework (VMF) "Form 3" establishing eligibility under the abovementioned 14 Hour Work Test
- ** Note: perhaps particularly in the case of 2013 events, where not already held by the relevant Club event Trip Leader(s), reference to your local DEWNR contact may be required. For future events it is suggested that a copy of this form be either obtained at the time of the event where possible, or subsequently sought from the authorising DEWNR officer involved and forwarded to the Club Coordinator for retention / future reference.

Issued passes will be posted to the Club Coordinator, who is asked to maintain a record for their Club, to facilitate ongoing scheme administration / Pass renewals etc.

Club Trip Equipment Requirements

Club members are expected to bring on all club trips (as a minimum) a basic recovery kit. This is noted on the club membership form as follows.

Equipment Requirements:

It is a requirement of membership that on club trips you carry a snatch strap and two load rated shackles, shovel, fire extinguisher, first aid kit and UHF radio.

The two load rated shackles should be at least 3.25t although larger 4.7t and 6t shackles may be better suited to use with tree protectors and winch/snatch blocks.



Bow shackles

are preferred to D shackles

have a larger enclosed area and can therefore better accommodate more than 1 attached item (such as both ends of a tree protector that has been wrapped around a tree as an anchorage point).

Recent Trip Reports (Pre-February 2014)

Peake - 28th December 2013

Eight vehicles met at the Tailem Bend Roadhouse at 7:30am and travelled in convoy to the property which is just outside Peake. Two more vehicles arrived later in the morning making a trip total of 10.

Once at the property we aired down (reduced tyre pressures) and spent the day driving the sand dunes and tracks. The sand was extremely soft and this made for challenging sand dune ascents.

Werner and Colin were present and a few club members undertook training and assessment in sand driving and snatch strap recoveries with a good degree of success resulting in assessments bring signed off in the training logs.

What was proposed as a weekend end trip ended up being a day trip as all in attendance only stayed the Saturday. It was however an enjoyable and at times challenging day of sand driving.

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Beachport - 25th to 27th January 2014 - Team Kevin

Kris and I left for Beachport mid Friday morning with our camper trailer in tow. Beachport is a comfortable five-hour drive from Adelaide. Our first stop was for some lunch at Tailem Bend, where we discovered that there is actually a main street that runs parallel to the main highway, a much better choice for lunch than the petrol station on the main road.

When we got to Beachport we quickly discovered that it was a real 4WD weekend. There were deflated tyres and sand flags everywhere; our caravan park had at least four 4WD clubs present, perhaps more. Our club stayed at the Southern Ocean Tourist Park, which is sheltered from the wind, green and clean, very acceptable.

As about half of the Adventurers club made it to Beachport, we were divided up into four groups. The idea was that two groups would do the northern Beachport to Robe trip and the other two the southern trip to Carpenter rocks, swapping around on day two. Our group was assigned the Robe to Beachport trip. So on Saturday we began with a leisurely drive up the bitumen to Robe where we fitted our sand flags and went off to find the entrance to the sandy area.

At the entrance to the park we aired down to 15 PSI, which proved to be fine for this trip. I found this to be quite an interesting trip. Sandy inland tracks and some time on





the beach as well. I found a couple of the entrances to the beaches a bit challenging, not sure how I would have got on using them to exit the beach. We found a nice sand hill or two; I chickened out going up the biggest one although I did come down it.




On the way we stopped to help two different travellers that were stuck on the beach.

Day 2 began a little earlier as the Carpenters rock trip is a bit longer and those that did it the day before said that it was quite difficult in places. Again we choose the bitumen first, airing down and stooping for an ice cream at Carpenters Rocks. Our leader kindly listened to our concerns about digging all day and chose to start the journey on the inland track thus avoiding the first couple of really soft beaches.

There was some concern that the inland track would just be a very boring dirt road, but it turned out to be an interesting trip. Just when you were really sick of going over endless of small bumps, it would change into twisty sections with nicely banked sunken corners to play around on. I learned a lot more about my car and we all had a good time Thanks to Kevin and Jenny for leading us astray.

K. I. T. - "KEEPING IN TOUCH" NGARKAT CONSERVATION PARK INTERCLUB WORKING BEE 29th & 30th March 2014

WHAT: Each year a group of volunteers from FWDSA affiliated clubs meet at the Ngarkat CP to undertake a number of tasks that have been developed in conjunction with the Senior Ranger, Natural Resources (SA Murray-Darling Basin, DEWNR) from Lameroo. These tasks assist DEWNR in maintaining, sustaining and enhancing the Ngarkat CP for all park visitors.

This year the work to be undertaken is generally on or near the one way section of the Ngarkat CP Border Track and includes fencing (repair, replacement or installation), fireplace & rubbish cleanup, signage, vegetation trimming, painting and rubble placement. DEWNR will be providing materials, equipment and specialist tools needed for the work.

The one way section of the Border Track is closed to public traffic until the first weekend of April and therefore will be closed to public traffic during the working bee.
